Interview with Willie Jones, 2007 Safe Surrender participant. The District of Columbia will be offering the opportunity to individuals who have non-violent felonies or misdemeanor charges to come forward and turn themselves in voluntarily in a safe environment. Individuals with traffic warrants, child support concerns and failures to report may turn themselves in by going to the courthouse and meet with the judge. Individuals are treated with respect. 77 individuals turned themselves in last time and all were release but one individual who had a warrant in another jurisdiction. Title: Reading, the Key to the World

Interview with Leicester Johnson, CEO of Academy of Hope, Adult Public Charter School. 1 in 3 adults in Washington, D.C., cannot read a newspaper or complete a job application. Washington, DC has one of the most highly educated populations, yet more than 21% of working-age adults lack a high school diploma. National Adult Education and Family Literacy Week is September 26th – October 1st. The disparity in adult education and literacy is staggering. For more than 30 years, AOH has been at work educating the most marginalized adults of DC, to help narrow the skills gap and empower them to break their cycle of poverty. AOH students' average age is 39, and approximately one-third report a learning disability.
