**DURATION OF SEGMENT :33**

HORNELL SCHOOL DISTRICT RESIDENTS WILL VOTE NEXT MONTH ON A BUDGET THAT COULD CARRY A 2-POINT-ONE PERCENT INCREASE IN THE DISTRICT TAX LEVY... THAT'S UNDER THE TAX CAP FOR THE DISTRICT. THE EVENING TRIBUNE REPORTS THE SCHOOL BOARD IS EXPECTED TO APPROVE THAT PROPOSED INCREASE AND THE REST OF THE BUDGET AT THEIR MEETING NEXT WEEK. THE INCREASE IN THE TAX RATE WOULD INCREASE THE SCHOOL TAX BILL ON A 100-THOUSAND DOLLAR HOME BY ABOUT 41-DOLLARS. FOUR TEACHING POSITIONS WOULD BE CUT UNDER THIS BUDGET THAT GOES TO THE VOTERS ON MAY 17TH.

THE TEACHERS STRIKE IN THE ATHENS AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT IS STILL ON FOR MONDAY. THE UNION REPRESENTING THE TEACHERS SAYS NEGOTIATIONS THAT WENT ON UNTIL MIDNIGHT LAST NIGHT FAILED TO PRODUCE A CONTRACT AGREEMENT. A NEWS RELEASE FROM THE ATHENS AREA EDUCATION ASSOCIATION SAYS THE SCHOOL BOARD DID PRESENT A WRITTEN PROPOSAL LAST NIGHT BUT IT DID NOT PROVIDE A FAIR AND EQUITABLE RESOLUTION TO THE IMPASSE. IT WENT ON TO SAY THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S QUOTE "REGRESSIVE BARGAINING TACTICS" MOVED THE TWO SIDES FURTHER AWAY FROM AN AGREEMENT. ON ITS WEBSITE SCHOOL DISTRICT OFFICIALS

SAY THEIR LAST, BEST AND FINAL OFFER WAS FAIR AND EQUITABLE THEIR RESPONSE ALSO EXPRESSED DISAPPOINTMENT THAT THEIR OFFER WAS NOT TAKEN TO THE UNION MEMBERSHIP FOR A VOTE. MORE ON THE DISTRICT'S RESPONSE AND COPIES OF ALL THEIR PROPOSALS ARE LISTED ON THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S WEBSITE. NO FURTHER NEGOTIATIONS ARE SCHEDULED.

A BILL THAT SUPPORTERS SAY WOULD KEEP PENNSYLVANIA'S BEST TEACHERS IN THE CLASSROOM IS PASSED BY THE STATE SENATE. IT'S ALREADY BEEN APPROVED IN THE HOUSE BUT GOVERNOR TOM WOLF IS EXPECTED TO VETO IT. UNDER CURRENT LAW THE TEACHERS WITH THE LEAST SENIORITY ARE THE FIRST ONE'S LAID OFF REGARDLESS OF THEIR IMPACT ON STUDENTS. UNDER THE BILL APPROVED BY THE LEGISLATURE SCHOOL DISTRICTS WOULD USE TEACHER \*PERFORMANCE\* TO GUIDE FURLOUGH AND REINSTATEMENT DECISIONS. IT ALSO WOULD PROHIBIT A SCHOOL DISTRICT FROM USING A TEACHER'S PAY AND BENEFITS IN DETERMINING ANY LAYOFF DECISION. HOWEVER GOVERNOR WOLF SAYS THE LAYOFF PROCEDURE SHOULD BE DECIDED BY LOCAL TEACHER CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS, NOT STATE LAW.

VOTERS IN THE SOUTHERN TIER HEAD TO THE POLLS TODAY. THEY'LL BE VOTING ON SCHOOL BUDGETS, PROPOSITIONS AND SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS. IN ELMIRA VOTERS WILL ALSO BE ASKED TO APPROVE A 51-MILLION DOLLAR CAPITAL PROJECT THAT DISTRICT OFFICIALS SAY WILL HAVE NO IMPACT ON LOCAL TAXES. THEY'LL ALSO VOTE ON APPROVING THE SALE OF THE FORMER WASHINGTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BUILDING AND THE FORMER ERNIE DAVIS MIDDLE SCHOOL. ONLY THREE SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN OUR AREA WILL NEED MORE THAN SIXTY PERCENT VOTER APPROVAL FOR SCHOOL BUDGETS TO BE PASSED. THE ARKPORT, JASPER-TROUPSBURG AND WAVERLY SCHOOL BUDGETS WILL NEED THAT BECAUSE THEIR PROPOSED BUDGETS EXCEED THE STATE TAX CAP FOR THEIR DISTRICTS.

DURING THEIR SEARCHES POLICE SEIZED ABOUT 23-THOUSAND DECKS OF HEROIN, 93-THOUSAND DOLLARS IN CASH AND NINE GUNS. OFFICIALS SAY PROCEEDS FROM DRUG SALES TOTALED IN THE HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS OVER THE LAST SEVERAL MONTHS.

THEY'VE GONE WITHOUT A CONTRACT SINCE AUGUST. THEIR UNION SAYS ITS TRYING TO STOP VERIZON FROM MOVING JOBS OFFSHORE OR CUTTING BENEFITS FOR INJURED WORKERS. VERIZON SAYS THE COMPANY HAS THOUSANDS OF NON-UNION WORKERS TRAINED TO COVER NEW ASSIGNMENTS IN THE EVENT OF A STRIKE.

30-minute program

My guests on this program were State Assemblymen Phil Palmesano of Corning and Christopher Friend of Big Flats. We discussed their opposition to the increase in the minimum wage and their concerns about the paid family leave program. Both believe that contrary to Governor's Cuomo's comments that it will not be an expense to businesses there will be hidden cost to businesses that will have to pass them on to customers or staff reductions. Other topics we discussed included middle class tax relief, school aid increases, the lack of state aid increases for cities, aid for roads and bridge work, the manner in which the budget was approved, the lack of ethics reform, increased funding for opioid and heroin addiction treatment programs and the two lawmakers different opinions of the \$500-million grant the Southern Tier will receive under the Upstate Revitalization Initiative.

4/24/16 – Pennsylvania Issues Affecting the Northern Tier  
30-minute program

My guest on the program was Pa. Rep. Matt Baker of Wellsboro. His 68th District covers all of Tioga County and much of Bradford County, Pennsylvania. Among the topics we discussed were the recently approved law legalizing medical marijuana in Pennsylvania, the teacher strikes in the Northern Tier and how Pennsylvania law varies from New York law in regards to public employee strikes, the state budget which was more than nine months late before finally getting approved, Standard and Poor's recent rating that the state's financial outlook is "negative", why the New York State Legislature, which also has a politically divided legislature is still able to make compromises with the governor to get budgets approved on time while Pennsylvania is not able to accomplish that, the diversion of state fuel tax funds to other state purposes and whether Pennsylvania should also increase its minimum wage.

My guest on this program was Jim Pfiffer, Director of Chemung River Friends. Chemung River Friends is a nonprofit corporation formed in December 2008 to preserve and promote the 45 mile long Chemung River. During the program we discussed the progress of the organization since it was formed and the increased awareness of the recreational opportunities the river provides. We talked about the number and location of boat launches, the growing problem of dumping old electronic devices along the river since the landfill started charging \$40 per item to accept them, organized cleanup efforts, security cameras being placed at boat launches, basic boating and paddling courses, river safety programs for kids, and the group's approach to tying into efforts to grow Downtown Elmira.

My guest on this program was Leslie Danks Burke. The Democratic candidate in the race for the Senate seat now held by Republican incumbent Sen. Tom O'Mara. Danks Burke talked about her personal experiences and qualifications for the job, her support of the recently approved increase in the state's minimum wage and family leave program, the lack of ethics reform in the 2016-2017 state budget agreement, the lack of transparency in the state budget process, what the state should do to battle the heroin and opioid addiction crisis, programs needed to help the

agricultural community, the overhaul of the Common Core program and progress being made in getting Upstate New York its fair share of infrastructure spending.

Other topics covered include an update on efforts to develop the Rosenbaum's and Marvin's site on West Water Street, finding a new owner for First Arena, bringing more businesses to the Interstate 86 corridor including a call center at the site of the former CCC building near the airport, new plans Downtown Elmira's Clemens Square and plans for using the grant money from the Upstate Revitalization Initiative.
